Pastor:

Tonight is a night for us to be together in the dark. But, so often, darkness scares us. Darkness is our nightmare. We've been taught to fear it, to avoid it, to keep the lights on, to think happy thoughts, to pretend everything's all right, and to not go into "that dark place."

Yet we are here tonight in the dark because God created light and dark, day and night, and said both were good. To fear darkness is to miss what we can see there and we can't see clearly anywhere else. So, here we are. We are in the dark.

We are here to acknowledge that we are in the dark about so many things: We have so many unanswered questions. We have so much fear and sorrow we can't make sense of--tucked away in secret places. And for some of us, we have fresh grief that's raw and feels unending.

We can hear in this night an invitation to not run so quickly to the bright shiny objects, to easy answers, and

loud, well-lit rooms. This sacred darkening makes room for all of who we are--for our laments and longing, our confessions and our cries. This darkness can help us see what we cannot see in the light. This dark and holy night can perhaps even be a night where dreams are dreamed, hope can be born.

Reflection for Advent Candle Lighting by Bonnie Kinscher

Pastor: We light this first candle in memory of those people we

have lost through death.

We remember them by name in our hearts or out loud.

We remember those whose lives were taken far too soon.

We give thanks for these people.

We treasure their memories.

(Silence)

We light this second candle to ask for deliverance from the

pain of loss.

We bring to mind all of the losses we have experienced

this year,

And all of the losses in past years that return to our minds

this time of year and bring sadness:

The loss of relationships, the loss of health, the loss of

jobs, the loss of financial security.

We ask that God bring us comfort and hope.

We light this third candle for each of us.

We offer up to God our pasts,

We ask that God take away the shadows.

We light this fourth candle as a symbol of hope and promise.

We invite and celebrate the coming of the One who promises us no more suffering. . .

"The people who sat in darkness have seen a great light, and for those who sat in the region and shadow of death light has dawned." (Matthew 4:16)

May it be so, Lord. May it be so.
